The major goal is to develop Barangay Alangilan into a Summer Capital and EcoTourism Center of Bacolod City.

Barangay Alangilan is traditionally an Agricultural Barangay and the Vegetable Bowl of Bacolod City. Today there are so many hectares of Fighting Cock Breeding farms in surrounding purok's. Having produced the best game fowl for Derby audience, it is being called the Home of the best Fighting Cocks. It is also the destination of tourists due to the presence of the Spring Water Swimming Resorts and the passage way leading to Campuestohan Highland Resort.

## **HISTORICAL BACKGROUND**

The most historic event took place in 1938 when Bacolod was elevated into a City through Commonwealth Act 326 passed by the National Assembly creating the Chartered City of Bacolod. Assemblyman (later Senator) Pedro Hernaez of the Second District sponsored the bill. The law was passed on June 18, 1938, but it was not until October 19, 1938 that the City was inaugurated because of persistent rains during the year. Bacolod City was proclaimed as Chartered City by virtue of Commonwealth Act 404.

President Manuel L. Quezon appointed Alfredo Montelibano, Sr. as the first City Mayor of Bacolod (now both deceased).

Barangay Alangilan started as a Sitio of Barangay Granada, Bacolod City in the year 1938. Before and after the World War II, the place was known as Sitio Capalaran. During that time, the Mayor of Bacolod City was the late Hon. Alfredo Montelibano, Sr. the father of former Provincial Governor of Negros Occidental and former Mayor of Bacolod City, Hon. Alfredo L. Montelibano, Jr. The first Barrio Lieutenant of Granada during that time was the late Melecio Quiachon.

Barangay Alangilan remained as Sitio Capalaran until May 1, 1962 when the said Sitio was created as a separate Barrio under City Ordinance No. 104, Series of 1962, defining its boundaries. The Bacolod City Mayor that time was the late Teofisto Cordova.

The first Barrio Lieutenant in Barangay Alangilan was the late Francisco Acot Guadalupe. He was named as the "Father of Barangay Alangilan."

The majority of the inhabitants executed a petition as required by the City Council for the creation of a new Barrio. Upon its approval, the name "Capalaran" was changed to "Alangilan". It was derived from the scented flowering tree known as Ilang-Ilang.

Alangilan is very rich of potable water because it has many rivers, creeks, and springs (under earth water), in different areas. The natural springs of Bucal-Bucal which is one of the water sources of the Bacolod City Water District is within the territorial jurisdiction of this Barangay. The Yulo Waterworks System was established as Water Utility Firm and laid their pipes in Bucal-Bucal springs in 1960.

On November 1, 1973, the Bacolod City Water District (BACIWA) took over the operations and maintenance of the Yulo Waterworks System of the City. It was agreed and covenanted pursuant to Memorandum of Agreement entered and executed by and between City of Bacolod and Bacolod City Water District. The Memorandum of Agreement was ratified by the City Council on January 14, 1974 by virtue of Resolution No. 4539, Seireis of 1974.

On the 124<sup>th</sup> regular session of the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Bacolod City held on November 20, 2003, City Ordinance No.346, Series of 2003 was enacted entitled "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE BACOLOD CITY NATURE'S PARK IN BARANGAY ALANGILAN". It was approved on December 01, 2003 by the then City Mayor Luzviminda S. Valdez. The primary objective of the enactment of said ordinance is for the purpose of establishment of Tree Parks, Eco-Tourism and Nature Parks to protect the watershed, prevent floods and soil erosion and maintenance of beautification project for the Baranagy and the City.

Barangay Alangilan is being called the "VEGETABLE BOWL" of Bacolod City. It is the "HOME OF THE FIGHTING COCKS". On December 15, 1999, the City Government of Bacolod under the leadership of former Mayor Oscar Verdeflor, this Barangay was awarded a certificate branding it as the "LAND OF SPRINGS".

## **LAND AREA AND OTHER DATA**

Barangay Alangilan is a Rural Community. It is located in the upland portion of Bacolod City. It is 16 kilometers from Bacolod City, bounded on the northeastern by forest reserve of Bacolod City. It is bounded by Talisay City in the North, and on the South by the Municipality of Murcia. It is 2,090 feet above sea level. It can be reached by means of private vehicles, tricycles and public utility vehicle as means of transportation.

It has a total land area of 13,267.50 square meters or 1,326.750 hectares. (CPDO 7-799) It has 24 Puroks. Its land use distribution is as follows: 70% Agricultural or 927.4636 hectares, 16% Residential or 211.9917 hectares, 2% Institutional lots or 26.49896 hectares, 2% Roadlots and other government facilities or 26.49896 hectares, 2% Commercial Lots or 26.49896 hectares, 2% Industrial or 26.49896 hectares, and 6% Reserve Forest zone or 79.4969 hectares.

Barangay Alangilan is 77% plain, 10% hilly, 5% slope slightly eroded and 8% slope moderately eroded.

This community is composed of 24 Puroks. A large percentage of the residents are Roman Catholic, others are Adventist, Baptist, Iglesia ni Kristo and Born Again Christians.

Regarding its labor force, 39.47% are Farmers, Farm laborers and Fighting Cocks Care Takers, 24.26% are House Helpers, Tuba Gatherers, and Vegetable Vendors.

And the remaining percentage are Professionals, OFW, Seamen, Self-Employed individuals or those who own Sari-sari stores and Vendors, PUJ Operators, Drivers, Fighting Cock Breeders, Government Employees and Private Employees.

With the rapid growth of population due to the development of subdivisions and low cost housing and favorable environment to enjoy, we envisioned Barangay Alangilan to be the future Summer Capital of Bacolod City. The presence of Spring

Resorts like Bucal-Bucal Spring Resort, Perfect Spring Resort, Purok 12 Old Quarry Resort, Monterey Resort and Dodoy's Ecological Resort are frequently visited by local tourists. The Newly opened Bantog Lake Ranch also serves as a new attraction. There will be a future development of EcoTourism Projects that have good prospects soon.

Its favorable climate attracted Fighting Cock Breeders from other parts of the province and many also are coming from other regions of the country.
